Dr. Hsieh will begin leadership of Hartnell College on Sept. 16

Starbucks team trains and prepares for Sept. 9 opening

Thanks to intense training and preparation on the part of its manager and student staff, Hartnell's very own full-service Starbucks is set to open for business on Sept. 9.

To begin with, the store will be open from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday, then expand into the evening and on Saturday at a later date.

Delays in the installation of some fixtures had led to a projected opening in October, but the hiring of store manager Lea Miller and about 15 student baristas has accelerated preparation. She is pictured here at the center rear.



The baristas, recruited from among 70 applicants, began two weeks of mandatory training on Aug. 26. They have been learning the equipment and beverage and food protocols in strict adherence with Starbucks standards.

In an email to her crew of student workers, Miller wrote, "We will forever be the team who opened the Starbucks at Hartnell College! It's really something special to be a part of! I'm thrilled to have the privilege of having you all on my team. Together we can make this a huge success!"

Pop-up food pantries for students will increase to twice-monthly

Following the first Pop-Up Pantry of the new academic year, on Aug. 30, the distribution of free food to students will continue at twice the pace of last year, with pantries on the second and fourth weeks of the month. The next two will be held on Sept. 13 and 27.

The pantry program is a partnership between Hartnell's Office of Student Life, Foster & Kinship Care Education and the Food Bank of Monterey County.



At the Aug. 30 event, held in the Student Life Center and at both the Alisal and King City campuses, 144 students received a bag filled with food and information about meal preparation and food distribution sites.

Departmental food pantries at various campus locations are also assisting students with food insecurity. Supported by the Hunger Free Campus Grant, these pantries provide assistance throughout the day at location such as Panther Learning Labs, TRiO, EOPS, Guardian Scholars, Mi CASA and MESA.

Panther squads notch early wins as fall 2019 seasons get underway

[Men's](#) and [Women's Cross Country](#) both opened with victories during the Beat the Heat event on Aug. 30 in Eureka, hosted by College of the Redwoods. The men's team achieved a perfect score, led by individual winner Jesus Avalos, with a time of 22.24. For the women, sophomore Daniela Salazar and freshman Valeria Gomez-Lozano took first and second, separated by less than two seconds. Both squads will face their first challenge of the 2019 season on Sept. 7 at the Fresno Invitational.

[Hartnell Men's Soccer](#) notched its first win of the season on Sept. 1, defeating Irvine Valley in the Hartnell Tournament, after losing to Cerritos the day before, 2-0. (Pictured is forward Raul Mago-Padilla against Cerritos). They have three more home dates in a row – on Sept. 6 against Lake Tahoe, on Sept. 13 against Butte and under the lights at Rabobank Stadium versus Cosumnes River on Sept. 17.



Panther Women's Soccer stands at 1-1-1 following early action. They defeated Modesto at home on Aug. 27, tied Rio Hondo at Ventura on Aug. 30 and fell to Ventura on Aug. 31. The women play Sierra at home on Sept. 6 followed by two road games.

Hartnell Volleyball overcame Sequoias in a hard-fought, five-set match in the season's first Hartnell Classic, 3-2 on Aug. 31. Earlier that day, the women fell to Folsom, 3-1.
