Castroville-based cohort in plant science to launch in fall



Hartnell will begin a new cohort program in plant science this fall at the Castroville Education Center, preparing

students for transfer to bachelor's degree programs at Cal State Monterey Bay and other California State University campuses.

The 15-20 students who participate will have opportunities for job shadowing and internships with north Monterey County companies. A class in agricultural and industrial equipment will take them off campus for other hands-on experiences. Overall, their learning will have a berries-and-artichokes emphasis, while still being fully applicable to leafy greens, vegetables and specialty crops throughout the Central Coast. "The program is designed around agriculture based in north Monterey County, but we're getting a lot of interest from students around the region, including in King City," said Clint Cowden,

Hartnell's dean of career technical education and workforce development, who also directs the Castroville Education Center.

Input from agricultural leaders during Hartnell's community listening sessions for Castroville revealed strong support for an accelerated program that dovetails with plant science degrees at CSUMB, Fresno State, Chico State, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo or Cal Poly Pomona.

Instead of leaving the area as freshmen to begin at a four-year university – and possibly never coming back after they graduate – students in Hartnell's program will start college in the context of Salinas Valley agriculture and be able to build early connections with local companies.

Personal stories highlight luncheon for foundation's employee donors


An informal appreciation luncheon on Feb. 11 attended by about 60 contributors to Hartnell's Employees for Student Success program featured a delicious Mexican meal, but the highlight was personal stories shared by a student and several employees.

Diana Mendoza (pictured), a sophomore from Soledad majoring in psychology, described employee donors collectively as an "invisible supporter" enabling her to "receive an exemplary education without the worry of not having enough money for books, gas or food."



Dr. Debra Kaczmar, dean of nursing and health sciences, recounted childhood lessons about the personal sacrifices that philanthropy may demand, and Bala Kappagantula,

director of information and technology resources, shared how his modest donation helped feed thousands of migrant workers dislocated by the pandemic in his native India.



The final speaker to offer a personal perspective on giving to support students was longtime Hartnell custodian David Jones (pictured). He stunned the Steinbeck Hall gathering by describing how he overcame a learning disability and the stigma associated with it.

Jones said that as a child in the late 1960s and early '70s in Grand Junction, Colo., he was sent to a "special school" whose students "were called 'mentally retarded,' pretty much." He spoke of his lifelong dream to complete a college degree, stymied by hesitation that came with his learning challenges.

As an employee donor to the Hartnell College Foundation, Jones said, he knows he is supporting students "who can come to this college and be able to do their education and not be ashamed of what their level is."

"That to me is probably the most important thing," he said, "because what you learn in life, and you also learn at this institution, is that people are willing to give you time and patience."

When Jones finished his story, one he had never told publicly before, he received a standing ovation.

NHS adds 4 full-time faculty and 2 part-time instructors


In addition to opening a new building, the Hartnell Nursing & Health Sciences program has welcomed four new full-time nursing instructors and a full-time respiratory care instructor this academic year, as well as adding two part-time instructors. The new full-time faculty are:

Steven Lisowski, a Chicago native, Marine veteran and second-career nurse who came to California two years ago and also works per diem in intensive care at Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare System. A former music teacher, he has a



Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) from DePaul University.

Laura DeFilippo, a 17-year nursing veteran who first worked in the finance world in New York City before switching to nursing, working first in intensive care at a large urban teaching hospital in Atlanta, and then completing her MSN. She subsequently worked for 6½ years at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula before joining Hartnell.





Eve Zepeda, who teaches respiratory care and is also director of clinical education, previously was a clinical instructor at Hartnell for five years. She has worked as a registered respiratory therapist since 2011, including nearly eight years at Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare System and six years at Natividad Medical Center.

Also new to the Nursing & Health Sciences faculty are part-time nursing instructors **Kelsi Lanphear** and **Melanie Santos**. Lanphear has been a registered nurse for the past two years and completed a MSN at Capella University. Santos has been a registered nurse at Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare





System for the past 25 years and has a master's in traditional Chinese medicine from Five Branches University in Santa Cruz.

Students on Fall 2022 honor rolls to be featured in Feb. 16 newspaper ad

After notifying students that they have earned recognition on the President's Honor Roll or the Dean's List for the Fall 2021 semester, and sharing the news with the college community, Hartnell will publish all 1,366 names in a full-page advertisement in the Feb. 16 edition of The Salinas Californian newspaper's print edition.

we seek to work towards Hartnell's vision of student success, and we believe that access to basic need products should not be a barrier between a student and their educational goals."
