Dr. Rodríguez announces awards for individuals' strength and resilience

During the Student Success Conference on Jan. 21, I announced nine recipients of Strength and Resilience Awards for their support of continued student success despite the pandemic. Truly all of our employees and students are deserving of recognition and thanks for courage and determination over the past 10 months.

These Strength & Resilience Award honorees, in four categories, were selected from among 37 highly deserving nominations:

STUDENTS

Melissa Orduño (respiratory therapy): As the single mother of two school-aged boys, Melissa's challenges have been especially great. While maintaining her own online learning in respiratory therapy and assisting her sons with theirs, she fell seriously ill with COVID-19.

Guadalupe Rodriguez (sociology): Guadalupe has demonstrated her ability to serve others as a participant in the Student Support Services/TRIO program. This fall, she took the lead to rebuild the TRIO Club.

FACULTY

Dr. Kelly Locke (mathematics): From the start of the pandemic, Kelly showed outstanding leadership in helping Hartnell meet Chancellor's Office requirements for



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delivering courses online. She led the Curriculum Committee's conversion of courses under an emergency blanket Distance Education Addendum.

Sandra Rudo (vocal music): Sandy's advanced use of technology and willingness to commit long hours enabled her students to continue their vocal music studies and to perform three times via YouTube – in spring and winter concerts and during the highly successful fundraiser, Gala for the Arts.

Dr. Ann Wright (biology): Ann is recognized for her leadership in translating the microbiology lab course into a virtual experience that still included hands-on learning. She also handed out take-home lab kits for students, taking time to personally offer encouragement to many.

CLASSIFIED STAFF

Geri Alonzo (program assistant I for College Readiness): Geri's tireless work and dedication have been instrumental in Hartnell's ability to maintain dual enrollment during the pandemic. Not only has she maintained communication with students through email and by establishing virtual office hours, she has assisted students in their transition as first-time Hartnell freshmen.

Celia Anderson (program assistant II for CTE and Workforce Development); When the pandemic hit, Celia immediately switched from her busy work on campus events and community outreach to join in establishing a student-led peer coaching model to support students in their transition to online learning.

Belen Gonzales (coordinator of jobs and internship placement): Belen has been instrumental in organizing virtual career and job fairs, maintaining work with K-12 educational partners and students, encouraging and mentoring Hartnell student interns, and going out of her way to ensure that students have reliable internet for their studies.

MANAGEMENT

Augustine Nevarez (director of student life): Through his determined effort and in recognition of great need, Augustine has provided the necessary leadership to maintain twice-monthly Pop-Up Food Pantries through distribution in the Parking Structure. He also led the way in establishing the in-person study area last month, creating a model to build on this spring.

Hartnell receives statewide award for energy savings and efficiency

The Hartnell Community College District has received a 2020 Excellence in Energy and Sustainability Award from the California Community Colleges Board of Governors for solar power generation and other energy-reducing steps expected to save \$26 million over their lifetime.

The projected 4.7-million-kilowatt hour reduction in electricity use offsets more than 3,300 metric tons of carbon dioxide – equivalent to removing 714 cars from the road each year. The 2.6 megawatts of solar photovoltaic generating capacity installed on the Alisal and Main campuses since 2013 includes a new 1.3-megawatt canopy system atop the Hartnell Parking Structure (pictured), which went online in July.

Hartnell was among five of the state's 73 college districts recognized on Jan. 19 for actions by their governing boards to drastically reduce their carbon footprint and save taxpayer dollars



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through lower utility bills or for leadership and teaching on climate and sustainability.

The award also noted how Hartnell has incorporated its energy-saving projects into existing career training programs and the college's STEM curriculum. Computer kiosks at the Alisal Campus and in the Willard Lewallen STEM Center on the Main Campus display real-time solar power generation.

"We are extremely proud of this recognition and affirmation from the California Community Colleges system," said Hartnell Governing Board President Erica Padilla-Chavez. "It's a win-win-win because we are reducing our climate impact, being a careful steward of taxpayer dollars and providing a highly relevant learning opportunity for students."

'State of the College' update shared with supporters of Hartnell



The Hartnell College Foundation on Jan. 28 delivered a live one-hour "State of the College" <u>program</u> (start at 5:42) via Zoom to more than 100 online donors and supporters of Hartnell.

Produced in the library/learning resource center (pictured) the event was co-hosted by Interim Superintendent/President Dr. Raúl Rodríguez, Governing Board President Erica Padilla-Chavez and Vice President of Advancement and Development Jackie Cruz.

In addition to a welcome from Padilla-Chavez and an overview from Dr. Rodríguez about college momentum and student success amid the pandemic,

the program included a 3.5-minute video <u>tour</u> of current Measure T bond-funded construction projects and a 15-minute video excerpt from a <u>panel discussion</u> by five students, moderated by Veteran Services Counselor Gemma Uribe-Cruz (pictured: plant science sophomore Juan Rodriguez).

Padilla-Chavez welcomed newly elected trustees Margaret D'Arrigo and Alejandra Gonzalez and spoke to the challenges the college and its community are facing at this time.

"We recognize that we're living in a rather interesting time," she said, "not just because of the pandemic, but we know at the national and local level there is public discourse. What you should all be very proud of is the fact that at this college, at your college, we're committed to creating the next generation of leaders, not just for our local community, but for the nation. We do that by



providing our students the opportunity to engage in diplomatic and critical-thinking conversations."

Dr. Rodríguez ended his presentation by introducing five new members of the foundation board, honoring late Salinas Valley philanthropist Andy Matsui and announcing fundraising numbers for calendar year 2020 – 2,843 gifts totaling \$5.9 million.

Cruz wrapped up the event by highlighting 18 lead donors for the three education centers and the Center for Nursing & Health Sciences. She concluded, "Thanks to each and every one of you for being part of the Hartnell family – and 'Salinas Valley Strong,' let's keep going!"

Employee giving campaign seeks to exceed 2020 mark

The Hartnell College Foundation has launched its 2021 Employees for Student Success giving campaign, with a fundraising goal of 200 donors contributing \$125,000.

That aims for an increase over 2020, when 184 employees donated \$118,133, with a recordhigh average gift of \$642 and 67 employees exceeding the \$1,000 mark to become President's Circle members, also a record high.



Total giving is \$815,000 since the effort was launched in 2010 during a time of economic crisis. The money goes to meet needs in such areas as scholarships, Dreamer students, emergency scholarships (rent, food, utilities, etc.) and athletics.

Jackie Cruz, vice president of advancement and development, announced the goal set by a 30-member employee-giving committee during the Student Success Conference on Jan. 21. She also introduced guest Ana Ibarra (pictured), a 2013 Hartnell graduate in biology and former WELI Scholar who went on to UC Berkeley and is co-founder of Xinampa, a Salinas-based biotechnology lab.

"I want to speak to the strength and resilience that I learned as a student at Hartnell," Ibarra said, "and I know that had to do with the administrators and the educators and everyone who built the community that I needed."

CHOMP returns seven ventilators loaned in March for COVID-19

Seven ventilators loaned in March by the Hartnell Respiratory Care program to the Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula (CHOMP) at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic have been returned.

Dr. Debra Kaczmar, dean of nursing and allied health, shared the news on Jan. 27, calling it a "good sign for Monterey County." Hartnell also loaned a total of 13 ventilators to CHOMP, Natividad Medical Center and the Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare System.

Assisting with the return of the ventilators were respiratory care students (pictured, from left) Maria Willis-Dizon, Kristi Albanez and Neftali Lazaro. The equipment remains available to CHOMP if needed, Dr. Kaczmar said.



2021 Killian Scholars chosen following December auditions

Three students have been awarded Killian music scholarships for 2021, which provides them with a \$2,000 scholarship award each semester, free private lessons and program-funded field trips to universities and concerts, coronavirus permitting. Auditions and interviews were held on Dec. 7.



Two of the recipients are returning from last year – Noel Padua, clarinet, and Jaycen Florez, euphonium. The new recipient is vocal music student Tatiana Magdaleno, who also plays the keyboard.

Since its establishment in 2018, Killian scholarships have benefited up to 10 full-time music students a year who apply and audition for the opportunity, which also requires maintaining a 3.0 grade point average and evidence of financial need. It was

endowed by a gift from the estate of Jack and Suzanne Killian, longtime supporters of the arts at Hartnell.

To qualify, students must show evidence of achievement in music, be prepared to enroll as a full-time music major at Hartnell and file a FAFSA application.

Magdaleno, who performs with the Hartnell Choir and Hartnell Chamber Singers and is part of a band called TNT & The Explosions, said the support will keep her on a fast track toward her goal of transferring to San Jose State and becoming a high school music teacher.


Coder Dojo coding classes adapt and persevere despite COVID-19

Hartnell's Coder Dojo computer coding classes for Salinas-area students ages 8-17 has forged ahead since the pandemic forced it to convert to all-online instruction last spring.

The weekly Saturday classes, part of the college's K-12 STEM Program, will run from Feb. 20 through April 10 for Spring 2021. They are taught by computer science students at Cal State Monterey Bay, including students in the CSin3 degree partnership with Hartnell. Hartnell students serve as program assistants.

This fall, 250 students participated, using curriculum adapted from the in-person program that was held at Hartnell's Alisal and King City campuses, as well as school sites in Soledad, Gonzales, Greenfield and north Monterey County. The in-person sessions typically had





about 400 students.

K-12 STEM Director Julie Stephens-Carrillo credited Coder Dojo Program Specialist Samuel Valdez and other staff for putting in the work to rework the classes – with PowerPoints and hands-on approaches – so even beginning students could participate and learn from home.

"We took the time and asked, 'What can we use and what can't we use?" Stephens-Carrillo said.

Salinas Valley Ag Tech Summit will be presented online March 18-19

Interim Superintendent/President Dr. Raúl Rodríguez will open the evening with a welcome and brief update on Hartnell's Agriculture and Business Technology Institute. The college is presenting the eighth annual event in partnership with the Western Growers center and the Salinas Valley Ag Tech Institute.

During the full-day program on March 19, morning sessions will feature agricultural and ag tech leaders presenting on key issues, including workforce challenges and the critical role of education. Afternoon sessions

will spotlight "Ag Tech in the Americas," providing a fresh focus on challenges and opportunities in Latin America.

Dr. Hortencia Jimenez, Hartnell sociology instructor, has signed a textbook contract with SAGE publishing to complete "The Latinx Experience: Interdisciplinary Perspectives," a collection of essays examining the shifting contours of Latinx identity.

Joined by co-author Dr. Maria Joaquina Villaseñor, professor of Chicanx-Latinx studies at Cal State Monterey Bay, she is inviting contributions of essays for possible inclusion in the book.

"Although this book is scholarly in nature, it will be broadly accessible to a wide range of audiences and suitable for use in undergraduate courses in community colleges, four-year universities, and perhaps, high school ethnic studies courses," the authors wrote.

Hartnell grad Armbrister wins national trophy in plant science

Tyler Armbrister, a 2019 Hartnell graduate from Watsonville who is now president of the Plant Science Club at Fresno State, won first place in the 2020 Presidents' Trophy contest on behalf of his club from the nationwide Students of Agronomy, Soils & Environmental Sciences organization.

Armbrister, who completed Hartnell degrees in agricultural business and plant science, won the competition by delivering <u>video presentation</u> showcased the club's professional opportunities, industry partnerships and fundraising over the past year. Judges from agronomy, crop science and soil science societies also evaluated the club's problem-solving skills, innovation, teamwork and creativity.

"Representing Fresno State at one of the most competitive and prestigious competitions in agronomy was truly a dream come true for our club," Armbrister told Fresno State News. "This year's competition posed unique challenges, and we still came together to adapt to the platform and overcome any challenges."
